I think all of these documents are a must read for every American. You can ignore the bad reviews of this book. On the title page there is a note stating the works enclosed are a product of the times, that views of things like gender and race have changed. This is a valid note from the publisher (and the only note I found beyond the listed works). Many of the letters and works enclosed do show a different social norm that what we are accustomed to today. Further, the Constitution is printed as it was originally written (most versions have the sections of slavery removed or struck out since they are made void by later amendments). I think we need to remember that most of these documents offer us a look into the *opinions* of our founding fathers. Just like us, our founding fathers often disagreed with each other but they didn't let differences interfere with dialog. The document that is beyond mere opinion, the Constitution, is still open for interpretation and modification (why there is an amendment process built in). Jefferson said it best, "some men look at constitutions with sanctimonious reverence, and deem them like the ark of the Covenant, too sacred to be touched. They ascribe to the men of the preceding age a wisdom more than human, and suppose what they did to be beyond amendment." Jefferson continued, "let us follow no such examples, nor weakly believe that one generation is not as capable as another of taking care of itself, and of ordering its own affairs...Each generation is as independent as the one preceding, as that was of all which had gone before." 0 of 1 people found the following review helpful. love this bookBy K.
