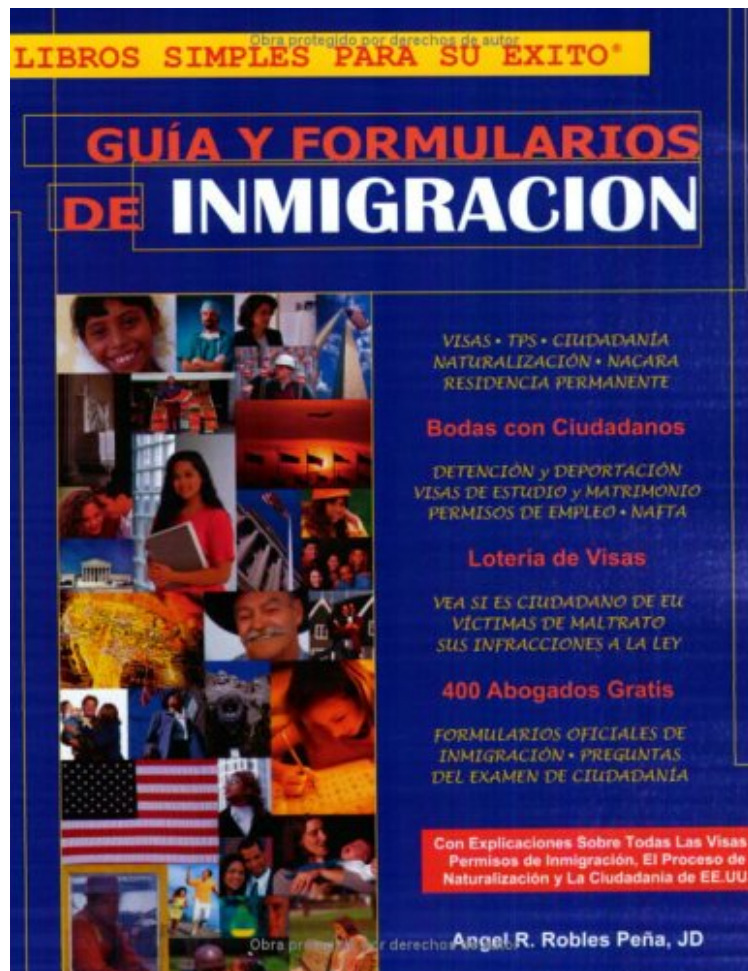

Gua y Formularios de Inmigracin is a plain-Spanish, laymans guide to U.S. immigration law. The book, part of InterMedias Libros Simples Para Su xito series (Simple Books for Your Success) informs Hispanic immigrants of their rights and responsibilities and advises them how to protect those rights. The book also provides common immigration forms and lists of social service agencies and lawyers providing free or low-cost legal services. Potential readers include: -- Naturalized Hispanics, who want to learn how to bring relatives to the U.S. -- Non-citizen Hispanics in the

U.S. under temporary visas, who want to learn how to become permanent residents. -- Undocumented Hispanics who worry about the consequences of being caught by authorities. -- Permanent residents seeking citizenship.

About the Author Angel Robles-Pea has been an advocate for Latinos for nearly a decade. An immigrant himself, Angel is acutely aware of the challenges Hispanics face in adapting to the laws and customs of the United States. He has dedicated his career to easing the transition of his fellow Latinos by making important information available, interesting and understandable to the common person. A year after migrating to the U.S., he co-founded what would become North Carolina's largest Spanish-language newspaper, La Conexin. While running the newspaper, he also served on numerous initiatives to improve conditions for Latinos, including the North Carolina Governors Advisory Council on Latino Issues and the Journal of Minority Issues and Economic Development. Angel later moved to Washington, D.C. to attend the Howard University School of Law, where he focused his course study on civil rights and immigrants' legal barriers. While at Howard he continued his advocacy work, furnishing his time to the Legal Aid Bureau of Maryland as a liaison to the Latino community and helping to write the Spanish-language version of the Constitution for the Maryland Latino Coalition for Justice. During his second year of law school, Angel began work on *Gua y Formularios de Inmigracin* and the other books in the *Libros Simples* imprint.
