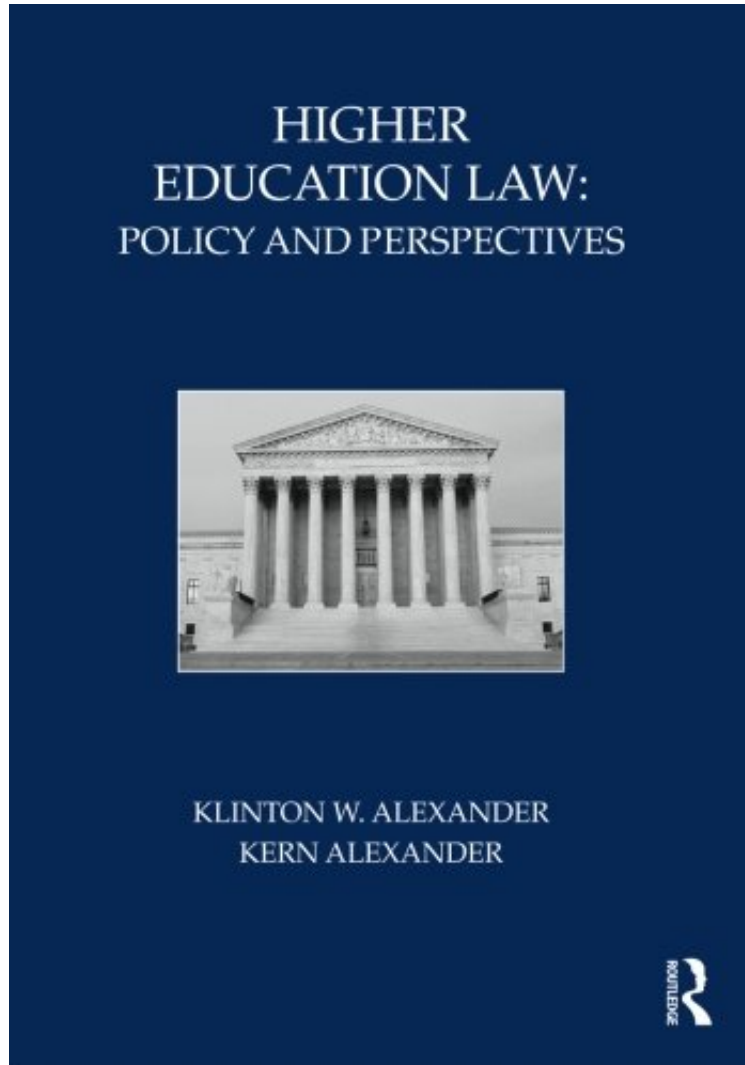

Reading the fine printBy FirebuilderThis book was required for a graduate course in Higher Ed Law and the cliché about 'reading the fine print' in legal documents is true in every sense. The cases in this book are well selected and summarized, but it is definitely written in legalese. When you page through this book, you are confronted with excessively long paragraphs in tiny font size with little space between the lines, which in my case resulted in a miserable groan at the sight of it.If that weren't intimidating enough, the type size

used in this book is so small that I had to purchase an e-book as well, so that I could enlarge the print and increase the line spacing to be able to read it. The cases presented in the chapters are using a different sans-serif font, which is actually smaller and even more difficult to read. If you have 20/20 vision you'll be OK with a print copy, but otherwise I suggest the kindle version from .It's difficult to get past the publisher's layout and small type in order to focus on the content. There is not a single picture or illustration, and only 3 or 4 small figures in the form of very basic flow charts in the entire 700+ pages. While the cases are interesting, and the authors do a pretty good job of organizing the content, it takes a good bit of dedication to manage to get through it. I took business law and entertainment law as required courses while an undergrad, and I liked both books better.
